The health trade press and news pages of the professional journals will very occasionally carry news and comment on Global Health, but the mainstream press tends only to do so when Global Health issues (a pandemic, or dramatic figures on HIV/AIDS etc, or through the involvement of high profile players such as Bill Gates) become items of current news or controversy.
